Ray found the following interesting race report about a 1915 Model T against a 2013 electric Tesla, from Detroit to Long Island!



The above link is about a staged race in 2014 in which we know the T driver is David Liepelt, son of Don Liepelt, we all have seen at the Mystic Seaport, "By Land and By Sea event with his Overland roadster.

We spoke to David a few years ago and he told us the T is hampered by reduced fuel pressure to the carburetor as the tank level gets lower and lower. Had he known that beforehand, they could have kept the tank full or added a tire pump to fitting to the fill cap and maintained a positive pressure to the tank as they drove.

During a recent business trip to Chicago I had the good fortune of staying in a hotel that was right next to a rather interesting bit of our automotive history. Unknowingly, I was right next door to the **Chicago Motor Club** building, an institution that I was completely unaware of. No longer used by the motor club the building is now a hotel itself, and remains open for visitors.

Built in 1928 the building is a classic example of the pinnacle of Art Deco architecture, still complete with furnishings, lighting fixtures, a period mural of the United States that shows all the major highways of the day, and even a 1928 Model A Ford on a second story balcony!








From its outset, members of the Chicago Motor Club sought to distinguish themselves by advocating for both automobile ownership as well as safer road conditions and better traffic flow. The club even had a profound impact on how the city of Chicago planned and improved its central business district. These improvements included the widening of streets, the addition of more restricted parking, and implementing traffic control signals. After hearing about the Chicago club's impact, other groups across the country—including the very well-known American Automobile Association (AAA)—quickly began to adopt a similar focus.
